

Benefiting from the increasing interest in Food Studies, the Students and Doctoral Students International Interdisciplinary Conference Thinking Food: The Functions of Food in American Culture and Society opens an academic discussion on various aspects of food in the United States. Contemporary American culture is saturated with representations of food and food practices. They are present in advertisements, culinary shows, online foodie communities and blogs, films and TV series, magazines and journals, and holiday tour options. Americans are also setting up urban gardens and organizing food cooperatives about which they blog and form grassroot communities. What is more, the US governments constant involvement in citizens food consumption and production methods, as well as reglamentation and availability of food products, have made food a political issue on par with war or energy crises. Mimicking the approaches employed by the food movements, the conference attempts to combine the academic with the practical, the scientific with the popular, and the corporate with the local to showcase the relations of domination and strategies of resistance.

### **Roundtable Participants:**

**ALEKSANDER BARON** is the creator and owner of Solec 44, one of Warsaw's gastronomic landmarks. He learned the secrets of cooking in Scotland and the Caribbean, and later was the chef at Nowy Wspaniały Świat. Lokal.Bistro, which he created, started the "slow food fast" trend in Warsaw. He promotes small, local food producers and suppliers. His columns and articles were published in Zwierciadło and Kukbuk.
