 - Created (with the assistance of student researchers) a <u>BMI website</u>, a <u>YouTube</u> <u>Channel</u>, and a <u>Teaching Toolkit</u>.
 - Organize a series of speakers and events each semester. Speakers include awardwinning writers, artists, filmmakers, and activists. Some recent highlights have included a series of talks with <u>UNHCR Archivist Monserrat Canela Garayoa</u> and <u>KBI (Kino Border Initiative) Director Joanna Williams</u>.
 - Established an ongoing relationship with Jesuit partners at KBI forming a hybrid internship/service-learning/study abroad experience in Dos Nogales Arizona/Sonora.
 - O Developed strong community relationships for intentional service learning with the Spanish speaking immigrant community in Buffalo which has included accompaniment of detained migrants in the Federal Detention Center, court support, and assisting in managing a food bank for families, and helping run a phone bank for detainee support.
 - O Crafted an RPG (Role Playing Game), an immigration simulation experience which we have adapted for both English and Spanish, and both in person and virtual participation. I conducted a workshop in Spanish for AUSJAL/AJCU through the Jesuit Network to Accompany Migrants based in Central America during a conference based in Nicaragua.

My courses include: Sexuality and Political Discourse; Detective Fiction; Magical Realism; Migration; LatinX Experiences in Literature and Film; Cuban Cinema of the Revolution, Pedro Almodóvar: Filming Desire, Contemporary Literary Moments, among others. Courses routinely include virtual or in person guest lectures, service learning, and community engagement projects. I established a YouTube channel for guest lectures and student content creation.
 - o I also direct various Honors Theses generally focused on issues concerning LGBTQIA+, LatinX/Latin America, and Migration.
 - o In addition to teaching undergraduate courses at Canisius I also teach every other year a graduate course in Spanish at the Ibero-Puebla University's Master's program in Applied Literature on writing, reading, and narrative strategies in contemporary literature. I will also be teaching a masters course (in English) on LatinX in the US for the Master's in American Studies at the University of Warsaw.
